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#### 1.0 Introduction

This report covers the third quarter of the SABSSM starting from the beginning of April 2002 until the end of the first week of July 2002. As was the case with the second quarterly report, no background information will be provided this time as this report should be read in conjuction with both previous quarterly reports. Instead, it will focus mostly on the progress that has been made on both the qualitative and quantitative research components of the SABSSM that have been undertaken to date. It should also be noted that this is the final progress report as the next one will be the draft final report that will be submitted by 15<sup>th</sup> October 2002.

### 2.0 Personnel

## 2.1 Appointments of additional key people to coordinate fieldwork

The following two key additional people were appointed to the HSRC team at the beginning of April.

#### 2.1.1 Mr François Bezuidenhout

The GIS Manager of Geospace International, the company that is setting up the Master Sample, was appointed as the fieldwork project integrator/manager for the duration of the project. He will oversee both the creation of the Master Sample during Phase 1 of the study as well as fieldwork during Phase 2. He has some invaluable previous experience of running big projects like the census. He also appointed Mr T. Phalatse to assist him.

#### 2.1.2 Miss Jeannette Bloem

She works as a consultant for Family Health International in Lesotho and is the fieldwork SABSSM manager for Phase 2 only. She has international experience running similar studies to SABSSM in several African countries.

# 2.2 Appointment of five American students funded by the Fogarty programme as research interns on SABSSM

As was reported in the previous report, the five Fogarty Scholars from Penn State University students joined SAHA for 3 months starting in May and their visit will end towards the end of this month. Their names, degrees of study and place of study are as follows:

Their main function has been to help with analyzing qualitative data using the ATLAS Ti computer software package under the supervision by Ms Dorkenoo. The students came to South Africa together with their mentor Prof Collins Airhihenmbuwa who is a world expert on the role of culture

on health issues. He is going to collaborate with us in August to write up the qualitative report for the SABSSM study.

# 2.3 Appointment of additional fieldwork supervisors/drivers for the main survey

To date, a total of 31 recently retired nurses with clinical supervisory experience and leadership skills or potential have been appointed as supervisors in the nine provinces. The breakdown per province is shown in the table below as well as the new targets which we hope to accomplish in order for us to fast-track fieldwork than has been the case hitherto.

## 2.4 Appointment of fieldwork nurses for the main survey

Some 127 fieldworkers have been recruited and trained so far. Most have started fieldwork while a few are still waiting to get started. Another 23 fieldworkers are still being recruited in order to bring the total to almost 150 nurses altogether to do the fieldwork on this project. This will include the additional 8 White and Coloured nurses who will also repeat Phase 1 fieldwork in the Cape Town area due to the poor response rates which have been realized so far as well as some of the notification researchers who will assist with Phase 2 work.

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## Additional explanatory notes:

## 4.1 Joint Steering and Technical Committees Meetings

Two monthly meetings have been held as required and their minutes are attached to this report. In addition, irregular teleconferences have been held in-between these regular meetings among some key members of the two committees in order to iron out some urgent issues that come up from time to time which must be resolved timeously without waiting for the next scheduled meeting.

## 4.2 Weekly project meetings

Since the start of fieldwork for Phase 2, core team members including, among others, Mr J van Zyl, the co-investigator and Ms Monica Peret, the Statistician, and Mr L Mokwena, the Geospace International's fieldwork supervisor of Phase 1.

### 4.3 Secondary literature reviews

Drafts by Drs M Colvin of the MRC and K Kelly of CADRE have been completed. However, they have not as yet been reviewed systematically to finalise them for inclusion in the final reports. This will hopefully be done by the end of August.

## 4.3 Preparation of an interim report on the qualitative research

This is now well advanced and should be completed a month before the quantitative report. As was mentioned earlier, Prof Airhihenbuwa of Penn State University in the USA will assist us with writing up.

## 4. 4. Main survey

The latest weekly progress reports by the Fieldwork Project Intergrator/Manager Mr Bezuidenhout and Statistician Ms Peret are attached at the end of the report. The highlights for each phase are shown below.

#### 4.4.1 Phase 1

- Close to 95% of the fieldwork has been completed so far. Only about 50 or so EAs with mine hostels or those that have been problematic or substituted are still to be completed over the next 2 weeks.
- Of just over 8282 visiting points that were visited, 7762 of them were valid. Of these 68% were interviewed and agreed to participate in the study.
- Main concern has been very poor responses with only just about 40% in the Western Cape agreeing to participate in the study so far. We are therefore planning to repeat notification from next week or the week after using White nurses in White and Coloured neighbourhoods in the Western Cape to increase the national average of response rates to just over 70%. We have devised various other means to communicate with the various communities in the Cape Town area. These include a letter from the Minister of Health in the provincial government as well as involving Muslim religious bodies more to gain better access to all communities.
- We also are replacing a number of EAs that yielded as many as 9 refusals out of 11 households visited.
- We are about to do some quality assurance checks on 5% of the EAs in each province to verify the accuracy of the information collected by the notification researchers.

#### 4.4.2 Phase 2

- As shown in the progress report provided, progress has been slow but improving all the time. Fieldwork is now in full swing in all the nine provinces of the country although a few teams have yet to start in some of the regions within some provinces. A major problem is not finding people at home during working hours in the week especially in the urban areas. Therefore, most of the work is usually done after hours and during weekends.
- We are planning to increase the number of fieldworkers to speed up data collection. We now have 35 fieldwork teams each with 3-4 fieldworkers, bringing the total fieldwork team close to 160.
- We have also deployed three mobile trouble-shooters employed by SAMMS who go and help out the supervisors throughout the country whenever needed including accessing difficult terrain as well as visiting special communities such as male mine hostels.
- We are currently setting up quality assurance mechanisms for Phase 2 fieldwork that as with Phase 1 will involve re-visiting 5% of the EAs in each province and administering a brief questionnaire both to households that agreed to participate in the study and those that refused to do so. This will involve notification researchers from Phase 1 who will work in teams of two people each who speaking languages used in each province and will start next week.
- When Phase 2 commences in each province the first set of questionnaires are quickly examined by the coding assistants for mistakes and a few interviews have been re-done to correct some of the serious mistakes done by the fieldworkers such as substituting participants and interviewing a person of the wrong sex or age in a household.
- Three regional supervisors have also been visiting the teams in each province to monitor progress and deal with any problems that arise from time to time.
