Children

Understanding and intervening in children's alcohol use

- Finland has one of the highest rates of 'binge' drinking in the world – among children under 13.
- We don't know what the rate in South Africa is.
- Little research.
- Anecdotal evidence from studies
- Children buying alcohol
- 'Growing in shebeen houses'
- Violence, early sexual debut, HIV related to alcohol



Children

Social and emotional learning (SEL) for children in impoverished communities: Utilising out of school time and teacher expertise to advance cognitive and psychosocial well-being of children especially in rural communities.

Aim: Contextualize state of the art advances for sub-Saharan Africa





Youth

Navigational capacities for youth employment: What do youth need to access employment in poor communities

- •Youth unemployment 51% among 15-24 olds in South Africa (Statistics SA, 2010)
- Higher than other developing countries
- Age of first job in South Africa, 26 for men and 27 for women

Aim: A mixed method longitudinal cohort panel study aimed at finding and measuring 'navigational capacities'

Target participants: Youth, youth agencies, youth employers)

Social cohesion through social networking for youth


- Social media allows for diverse interactions

Youth

Marginalised youth sexualities

- Centres on the experiences of young gender non-conforming people on the urban peripheries of Cape Town. [LGBTI]
- Considers the intersections between gender, class, geographical location, and sexuality.
- New research methodologies for accessing invisible groups.
- Post-colonial feminist perspective
- Critiquing power in researcher-informer relationships.

Advancing the humanities

"It is the role of the Humanities to produce and sustain a viable and lively intellectual community able to deal skeptically and perhaps even subversively with injustice, corruption and all the blandishments of power. Even after apartheid, these *can* reappear"

- philosophy, psychology, sociology, educational, theological
- Moral panics, corruption, violence and crime, including child abuse and gender based violence



Humanities: Social sources of creativity



To examine discourses of social identities, social change and resistance in music amongst youth

- How does South African music disrupt hegemonic notions of personhood (race, class, gender and sexuality) and articulate alternative identities?
- How is a politics of resistance, and social transformation being articulated through music? Kwaito, Zef, Gospel
- Using art-based methods, and historical archives
