The 15th Biennial Congress of the African Association of Political Science (AAPS) was held in Cairo Egypt from the 19th-21st September 2005. The theme of the conference was: 'Globalization, Sustainable Development and Governance in Africa. Contributions to the congress in respect of the theme were wide and varied and centrally focused on the capacity of the state to absorb the nuances of globalization and the implications for governance. Generally discussions in the various panels tended to examine the scholarship on development and the role of the state in this regard. In honouring the work of Dani Nabudere and celebrating Walter Rodney's seminal contributions on Africa's underdevelopment, it was agreed that a new epistemological discourse was needed to explain and address the challenges of globalization and its perverse impact on development and governance in Africa. A common theme that emerged from the conference was the need to reintroduce a central role for the state, particularly in the form of a developmental state. Clearly participants were adamant that for Africa to remain within the construct of the global system its underdevelopment had to be addressed in a more profound manner. In this regard the discussions generally pointed to other models of development namely the Lagos Plan of Action and Alternative Framework to Structural Adjustment Programme (AF-SAP). To this end participants felt that NEPAD did not engender the historical continuity of Africa's development models and tended to be more aligned to what Africa's development partners wanted.

In addressing how Africa can overcome and translate the negative consequences of globalization into positive outcomes, participants felt that a united Africa was critical to the process. In this regard greater linkages with North Africa was stressed and defined by the opening plenary session on Afro-Arab relations. Moreover it was felt that Africa's struggles against underdevelopment must remain a central focus so that future generations must be aware of previous attempts to reverse this trend, especially when trying to design a future model of development for the continent.

Overall the congress included almost 70 presentations (see attached program) with topics ranging from special case studies on the political of economy of oil in West Africa to Africa's relations in the broader international community. Questions related to the theme focused principally on: globalization with all of its internal and external contradictions and the context for economic development in Africa. The congress was divided into the following sub-themes:

- *NEPAD* and Globalization; Governance and Globalisation;
- Gender Responses to Globalisation; Globalisation and Sustainability;
- The Environmental Challenge:
- The Politics of Natural Resources: Revisiting the New International Economic Order (NIEO): Lessons from Past Experiences;
- WTO: Policies and Programs and
- Revisiting the State in Africa.

Flowing from the presentations and related to the sub-themes the following questions emerged: Can Africa's natural resources and environment endure the onslaught of globalization and the internal demands of production? Are the continent's governance structures, across the 53 odd states, capable of managing both the political and economic aspects of globalization? What institutional transformations would be necessary for the State in Africa (post-colonial, post-structural adjustment) to regain its relevance- and perhaps also centrality- in the management of the continent's political economy? Finally, how would 'democratically-elected' African leaders respond to the multi-faceted phenomenon of economic globalization in relation not only to the West but also vis-à-vis African people?

As an output of the congress a communiqué was produced which essentially called for a more nuanced approach to Africa's developmental trajectory and which needed to incorporate an African approach to development. In this regard the communiqué called for the state to play a central role in accordance with non-state actors.

The congress concluded with adoption of the communiqué and a new executive committee was elected with Dr. Eddy Maloka, ED of AISA, as president. The next congress will be held in 2007 with several countries including Morocco and Uganda bidding to host it.
