

- Bt20 investigates child health & development
- 3273 births of 5449 births in greater Jhb Metropolitan
- Attrition of 1.9% per year, 72% of sample Measures are physiologic & social



Black & Indian females HSRC/MRC data shows biggest decline for HSRC /MRC (95)10% daily




