AN EMPIRICAL QUALITATIVE STUDY OF 15 PRIVATE PROVIDERS

- Institutional profile physical resources and facilities, staffing, programmes, student numbers and organizational data
- Observational inventory extent and conditions of teaching, support, physical and social facilities
- Documentary sources brochures, institutional submissions, course material etc
- Individual interviews with key management figures
- Focus group interviews with selected staff members
- Focus group interviews with selected students
- Survey of students random selection of classes – total sample= 1222 students

A CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK DRAWN FROM THE INTERNATIONAL COMPARATIVE LITERATURE


Determine convergence and divergence along the dimensions of
