

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Context and caveat

Preliminary reflections

- Are masculinities the exclusive preserve of biologically male subjects?
- What are the ways in which female subjects lay claim to masculinity?
- What are the impacts of this on unfixing the relationship between biological sex and gender and in enabling alternative discourses around masculine bodies?
- Multiple female masculinities: 'lesbian' sexualities and genders
- Masculinity re-signified through particular lesbian masculine expressions

Locating female masculinity

- Understanding of hegemonic masculinity
- Co-construction of masculinity and femininity
- FM as historical fixture in the construction of model masculinity
- Masculinity, power and the denial of FM
- Destabilisation: binaries, 'naturalness' and meaning

FM as challenge and challenged


- Not as imitation: 'a copy of a copy'
- Assumptions: forms, functions and representations of masculinity
- Authentic, essential masculinity that is marked by and through male bodies
- Vigorous disavowal and violence

Multiplicity, alterity and possibilities

- Breaking open masculinity: alternatives, contradictions, discordance, space for pluralities
- Destabilise hegemonic forms, modalities and rationalities of gender

Masculinity as performance

- Butler: "performativity as that aspect of discourse that has the capacity to produce what it names."
- Performativity allows for 'becoming': disrupts the 'is' that is required for gender/sex to exist


Culture and tradition

- Invoking possibilities: hegemonic patriarchal cultures and traditions and the possibilities to unfix/subvert these.
- Where there is socially constructed power, there is always resistance (Foucault, Butler): agency in defining who we want to be

Subversion and possibility

'I wished for us to stare back as black lesbian-identified women, to resist and challenge the idea that our bodies can be researched, understood, displayed for heterosexual and western consumption' (Muholi, 2009: 4-5).

A caution: "Ultimately alternative masculinities will fail to change existing gender hierarchies to the extent that they fail to be feminist, antiracist and queer."
